18 OR MORE DAYS

- Excused and unexcused absences represent lost time in the classroom and lost opportunities to learn.
- Missing just one day every two weeks can add up to 18 days in a year. Absences add up before you even know it.



10 TO 17 DAYS

- Students who are absent an average of 15 days a year miss a year's worth of school before their senior year.
- When students miss a day of school it actually puts them two days behind their classmates.



9 OR FEWER ABSENCES

- Students with good attendance generally achieve higher grades and enjoy school more.
- Children benefit and make the most of their educational opportunities if they attend school regularly and on time.

This year we continue to use our "bucket filling" concept to emphasize our three expectations throughout the building... "Be Safe", "Be Responsible", "Be Respectful". Any time a student is seen displaying traits worthy of receiving a bucket fill slip, his/her name is added to the class bucket. Every staff member is recognizing students this year! Every week, at lunch, each class has a bucket filler name drawn. That student then receives a treat in the cafeteria and is recognized by the staff, along with their peers.

This year we have also been working our way through Second Step, which is our Social & Emotional Learning curriculum. Lessons vary from grade to grade, but include topics such as self-regulation, social skills, and empathy to name a few.

We also implemented our School-Wide Expectation matrix at the beginning of the school year. This emphasizes to all students and staff how to properly conduct themselves in all areas of the building. We are anxious to see growth in our students

this year and as they move throughout their school careers.

MCKENNA BRAZ



Tips for Parents for Parent-Teacher Conferences

During the school year, teachers will invite you to come to parent-teacher meetings (also called conferences).

Getting Started

- ➤ What: The conference is a meeting between you and your child's teacher.
- **When:** Your child's teacher will contact you to set up a meeting time.
- ➤ Why: The conference gives you a chance to talk with your child's teacher.

Ouestions

- ➤ What will we talk about? Your child's teacher will probably talk about your child's grades, classwork, homework, and behavior.
- ➤ What will I learn? You will learn more about your child's classes, and find out if your child is having problems.
- ➤ What will the teacher ask me? Teachers like to learn about students from their parents. No one knows your child better than you do. You can help the teacher by talking about:
 - What your child likes to do
 - o Events that may affect your child (such as a new baby, divorce, or death)
 - o Special medical and learning needs

Before the Conference

- Ask your child how she feels about school.
- > Tell your child that you and the teacher are meeting to help her.
- Ask your child if there is anything that he wants you to talk about with his teacher.

During the Conference


- > Be on time for the meeting.
- ➤ Relax and be yourself.
- Ask the most important questions first.
- > Ask for explanations of anything you don't understand.
- > Thank the teacher.

After the Conference

- Talk about the conference with your child.
- Talk about the positive points, and be direct about problems.
- > Tell your child about any plans you and the teacher created.
- ➤ Keep in touch with the teacher during the school year.

Things to Remember

- ➤ If you are invited to a conference, it doesn't mean your child is in trouble! Teachers try to meet with all parents.
- > You and the teacher both want the very best for your child. You can help your child by working together as a team.
